# Every Which Way

Hudson Yards is as accessible as any neighborhood in New York, and more accessible than most. Here's what you need to know whether you're coming or going...

### ... by subway:

The No. 7 station—with its main entrance between 50 Hudson Yards and 55 Hudson Yards just off 34th Street—is one stop from Times Square and offers connections to every subway line in the city.

### ... by bus:

The M34 stops at 34th Street across from 55 Hudson Yards and the M12 stops nearby on 11th Avenue.

### ... by commuter train and bus:

Penn Station is a two-block walk to the east and Port Authority is less than a 10-minute walk to the northeast.

### ... by car:

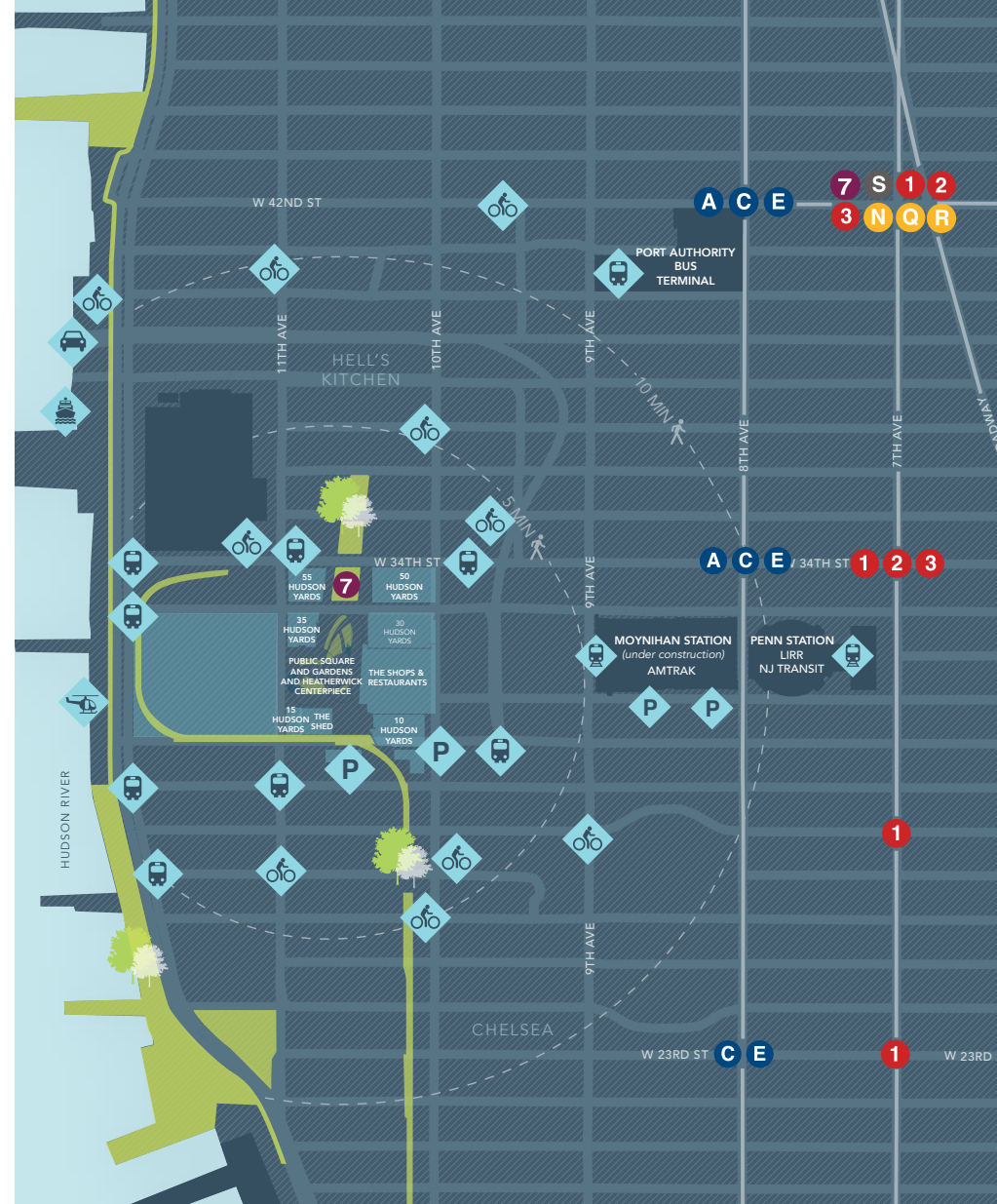
You're less than a minute's drive away from the West Side Highway—and there are plenty of lots nearby.









### ... by bike:

There are multiple Citibike stations throughout the neighborhood.

### ... by water and air:

The Hudson River Ferry docks at Pier 79, just blocks away at 12th Avenue and West 39th Street. Helicopters fly into a heliport at 30th Street and 12th Avenue.

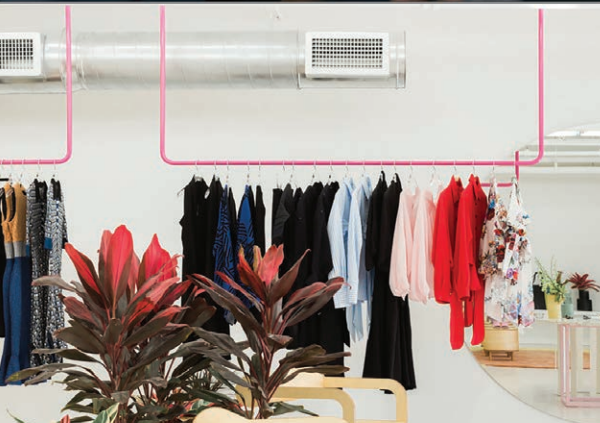

### Note: Don't be offended—it stands for Where's the Food?

From early-morning jumpstart to late-night snack, your every hunger and hankering is well covered.



**Death Before Decaf!** Back in the day, an Ethiopian goatherder watched his flock rev up after eating red berries off a native shrub, and now we all begin our mornings the same way. But if you're doing it, you should do it right. There are many coffee-centric spots at Hudson Yards, and we asked some of them to help you get the most from your caffeine fix.

### Brew It Yourself

First ... how to brew a pro-style cup at your desk.

**The Expert** Michael Phillips, Director of Coffee Culture, **Blue Bottle Coffee**

Of course, our baristas always grind their beans to order, but that loud whirl won't endear you to office mates. So be a good neighbor and grind at home (or buy some of our preground, premeasured, hermetically sealed envelopes), before trying this fool-proof, pour-over method. (I'd recommend The Blue Bottle Dripper paired with our bamboo filters, but of course I would.)



- Boil 1 1/2 cups of water.
- Place filter in dripper. Set dripper on top of mug. Add ground coffee to filter; tap side to level grounds.
- In spiral motion from edge to center, pour just enough water to saturate grounds (about 1/4 cup). Pause for 30 seconds so coffee can "bloom."
- In spiral motion working from center to edge then back to center, slowly pour remaining water over coffee in three equal pours, pausing after each until water recedes almost completely.
- Remove dripper. (Quickly place filter in garbage or on some otherwise disposable piece of paper; coffee stains!) Enjoy.

### Pours and Pairs

Hey, a person's got to eat, too.

**The Expert** Chef Alessandra Altieri Lopez, Culinary Director, **Bouchon Bakeries**

#### You're sipping ... You're munching ...

Coffee	A blueberry muffin with an almond streusel topping. The tartness of the berries and saltiness of the almonds complement the natural bitterness of the drink.
Espresso	A macaron. A bold shot calls for a sweeter, richer pastry.
Latte	Chocolate éclair. The fruity and floral chocolate custard filling—the darker the better—stands up to the steamed and foamed milk.
Cold brew	Our Bouchon brownie. Its richness brings out the natural chocolate undertones of the coffee.
Herbal tea	Shortbread. A delicate flavor requires a subtle partner.

### Bean There, Drank That

Most everyone likes coffee, but New Yorkers like it the most, drinking seven times more than any other city's denizens. But that doesn't mean we all love the same varietal.

**The Expert** Jack Mazzola, Founder, **Jack's Stir Brew Coffee**

Our traditional Stir Brew Roast is made from organic, fair-trade, shade-grown beans from Guatemala (for earthiness), Honduras (for color), and Mexico (for the chocolate undertone), but I also recommend:

**Ethiopian:** Very floral—too much so for certain palates—but some smaller growers also produce beans that yield a complex yet low-acid cup.

**Dominican:** Higher-altitude, shade-grown beans from this Caribbean island offers a mix of earthiness and sweetness.

**Jamaican:** A little pricier, but the soil profile and altitude of the Blue Mountains make for an intense flavor profile.

Whatever the varietal, though, make sure you go organic. The flavor profile is more pure and delicious, not masked by pesticides and chemicals. And make sure you go fair trade too. You want to guarantee those hard-working families a good wage, don't you?

### Coffee as Cure

And you thought the energy boost was all your morning joe was good for.

**The Expert** Georgia Goldsbrough-Reardon, Education Director, **Bluestone Lane**

**Matcha latte:** A smooth, rich and enticing blend of high grade Saemidori and Goko varietals, which naturally detoxifies the body while providing fiber, chlorophyll, vitamins, and most notably, antioxidants.

**Beet Latte:** This dehydrated beetroot and almond milk drink, mixed with a dash of cocoa powder, can help reduce blood pressure and promote healthy digestion. Added bonus: Betacyanin, the bright magenta pigment, is another powerful antioxidant.

**Golden Latte:** This combination of turmeric, spice, cinnamon, ginger, black pepper, and almond milk, is a natural antiseptic and antibacterial agent, as well as a detoxifier.

# Is it Lunch Yet?

We can't wait for noon to roll around, and yet it is a hard workday truth: Lunch rarely gets the attention it deserves. More often than not, most of us just head to the same deli to place the same order because it's fast and easy. And that's if there's even time to leave our desk. That stops now. Our food-forward friends at **Citarella** are here with tips that are guaranteed to help you rediscover the glory of the midday meal. (And, yes, you can get versions of most everything below at Citarella's store on Level 2 of The Shops & Restaurants at Hudson Yards.)



### 1. STASH SOME FLAVOR IN YOUR DESK

There's no easier way to raise the quality of office lunches than with a few well-chosen spices and condiments. Tastes will vary, but results will not. You won't go wrong with this starter kit:

- sea salt grinder
- black peppercorn grinder
- crushed chili pepper flakes
- 100% Sicilian extra virgin olive oil
- balsamic vinegar

### 2. WHEN IN DOUBT, VISIT THE ROTISSERIE

A single roast chicken goes a long way. Pick one up at the beginning of the week, and it can get you through two or three meals. Eat it as is or in a sandwich, or stop by the salad bar, choose your favorite ingredients and invent a tasty bowl.

### 3. EAT WELL, BE WELL

Call it culinary self-care—treating yourself to something you might not usually think to eat at your desk. Grilled fish, for example, is a fast, fresh, healthy—and too-often-neglected—lunch option. Exactly the right size for a single meal, it costs about as much as a good burger. Decadent? Hardly. More like what lunch should be.

### 4. MAKE IT A PARTY

Any workday lunch tastes better when it's shared. And nothing shares quite like pizza. Are we partial to our thin-crust, brick-oven Margherita with tender artichokes and fragrant Italian sausage? Well, yeah (although we'll make you whatever you want). But the more important point is that any office lunch is improved when it's experienced with colleagues.

# The Happiest Hour

When 5 o'clock hits (or 6 or 7 or 8...), you'll find lots of winding-down spots at Hudson Yards. But after a long workday, who has any outside-the-box thinking left to expend on your cocktail order? Not to worry, a couple of our resident mixologists have some interesting alternatives that you can order at their establishments or concoct at home.



### FROM THE TEAM AT QUEENSYARD:

*Instead of a ... Moscow Mule. Try a ... Mamie Taylor.*

It's basically the cocktail you're used to with a blended Scotch substituting for the vodka. The flavor adds depth, enhanced by some angostura bitters too. Try it even if you aren't partial to Scotch; the ginger beer downplays the whiskey taste.

*field note: when the workday is done, go to...*

*Instead of ... Vodka and Soda. Try a ... Gin and Tonic.*

Think about it: gin is essentially a flavored vodka, starting as a neutral-grain spirit before being passed through botanicals to pick up flavor. And to those of you who say gin makes you sick, may we suggest that's because it's higher in alcohol content than most other spirits. Solution: Sip a little slower. (That makes it better for the budget too.)

*Instead of a ... Negroni. Try an ... Old Pal.*

The Negroni is the easiest cocktail to fiddle with because you can switch out a component or two and still end up with something suitably quenching. For example, swap the gin for rye and—voila!—an Old Pal. (Flip the bitter—Campari for Suze—and the sweet—Vermouth Rosso to Vermouth Bianco—and you're drinking a White Negroni. Either way garnish with a lemon twist not an orange one.)

*Instead of a ... Manhattan or Old Fashioned.*

**Try a ... Manhattan or Old Fashioned, with a tweak.**

In place of rye, order it with armagnac, another higher-proof, oak-aged spirit. Brandy used to be the king of cocktail spirits, but it's underutilized today. Frankly, it has more complexity than bourbon or rye.

Our friends at **Wild Ink** feature a cocktail menu that leans heavily on sake- and tea-based drinks. But they've got more ideas than they know what to do with, so here's one they're happy to give to you:

#### **Royal Dutch Tea Cocktail**

35 ml of genever  
25 ml of ratafia (or peach liqueur)  
20 ml of grapefruit juice  
20 ml Earl Grey tea  
Manuka honey

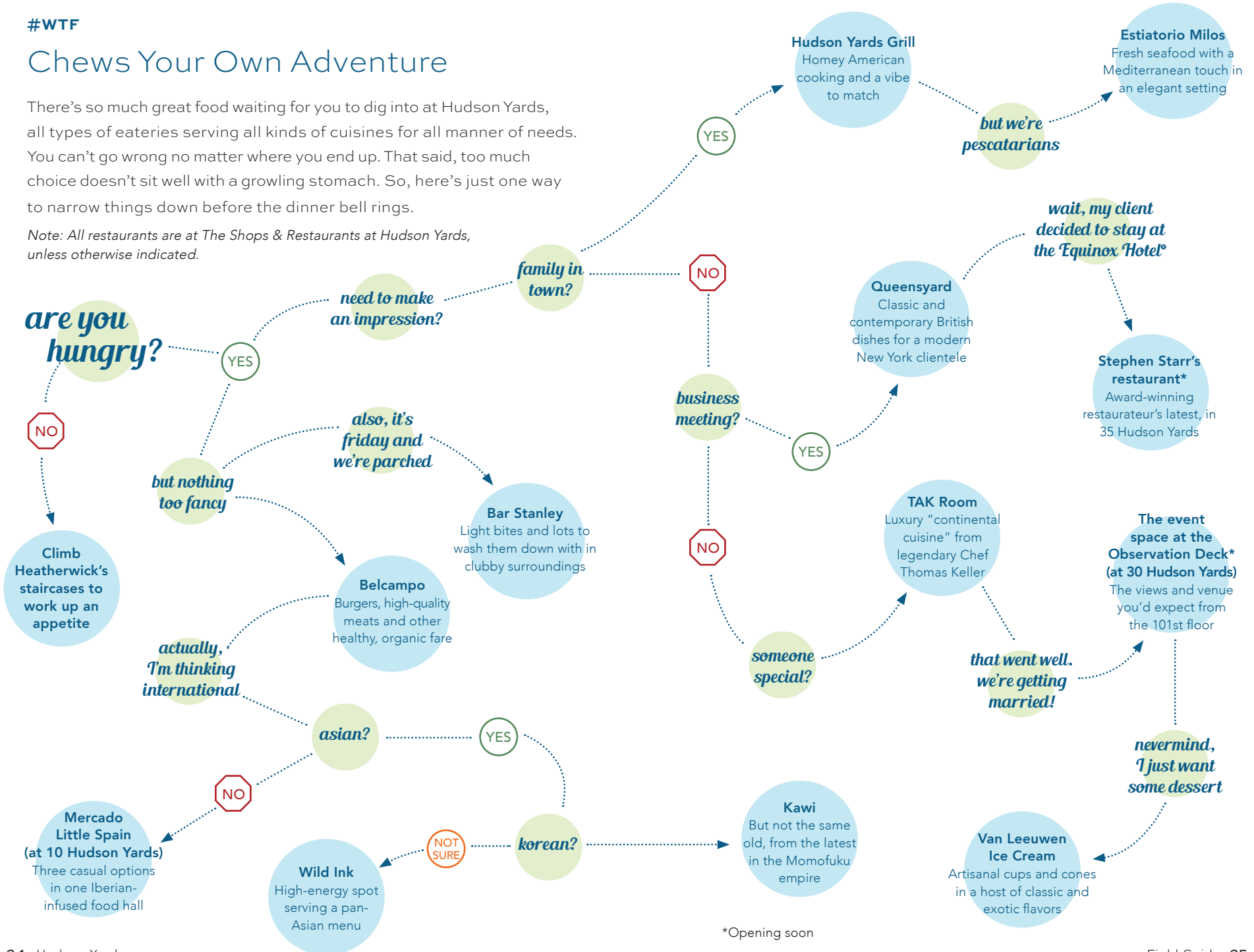
Brew tea then mix it with honey at a ratio of 2 to 1.  
Add remaining ingredients and ice.  
Stir and pour.

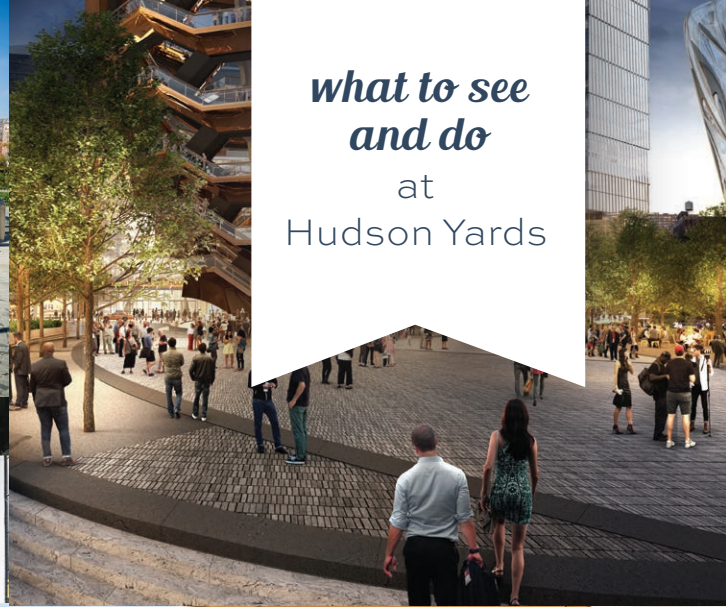
## Mercado Little Spain

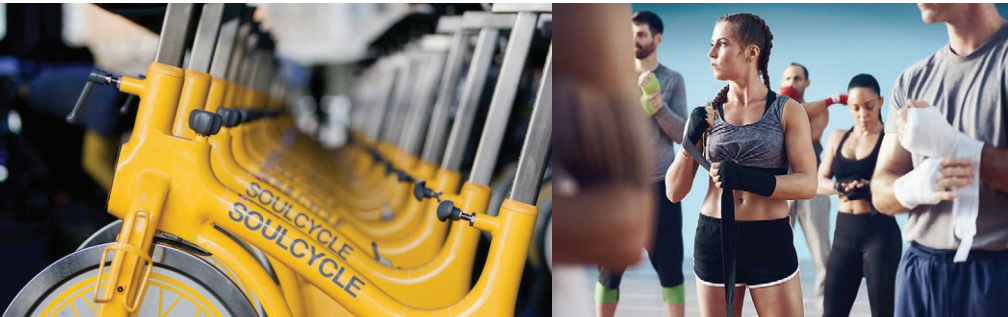

## TRAINING TRICKS FOR THE HIGH-PERFORMANCE LIFE

**Your Wellness Guru** David Harris, the architect of health and performance at Equinox® and a proponent of the three key elements for a healthy lifestyle—Movement, Nutrition, Regeneration. Here's his advice to find the right balance for your body.



**Change up your routine:** If you are a dedicated weight lifter, explore yoga. Love spinning or running? Try loaded movement or resistance training. It forces adaptation neurologically, which is essential for aging well.

**Redefine the power lunch:** Grabbing something to go? Make sure it's organic and, as much as possible, not packaged or processed. My lunches tend to be 70 percent vegetables/30 percent protein, though I don't eat the same thing every day. I don't want to be bored, and it's important to vary your nutrients.

**Breathe better:** As in, don't hold your breath (you do it more than you think you do). Also: in through the nose, out through the mouth. If you are wearing a heart rate monitor, you'll see a 5-10 BPM drop.

**Combat the mid-afternoon crash without carbs:** Vitamin B12—it's a nutrient we are often lacking. I put a drop under the tongue so it can be rapidly absorbed.

**Buy a nice water bottle:** And keep it with you as you go about your day, just as you do your phone. I've made a habit of filling my bottle as soon as it's empty, as a cue, and I drink 3 to 4 liters a day.

**Stop multitasking:** It's officially not good for you and it makes you less efficient. It also builds amyloid plaques, which are the same type of plaque that clogs the heart.

**Get some sleep:** Seven hours, at a minimum. And practice good hygiene—no technology one hour before bedtime, keep your room chilly and make sure it is blacked out. Light is a chief disruptor of the body clock.

# The Public Square and Gardens

Once the western portion of Hudson Yards is completed, half of the campus will be parks and plazas. That includes five acres of gardens and greenery in the Eastern Yard alone, filled with more than 28,000 plants, 200 trees—many native to New York—and one attention-drawing landmark designed by Thomas Heatherwick. Though there's no shortage of places to enjoy it, we'd like to direct you to the mile-long bench that lines the path. (Bring your laptop, so your boss won't mind if you stay a bit longer.) We asked our landscape architect to take us on an insider's tour of the outdoor spaces. For an up-close view of Heatherwick's interactive structure, turn the page.

**Your Guide** **Thomas Woltz**, principal of Nelson Byrd Woltz, and creator of iconic public spaces like Houston's Memorial Park, the Devonian Botanic Garden in Alberta, Canada, and Cornwall Park in Auckland, New Zealand.



## What was your inspiration?

Have you ever taken a trip north to Harriman State Park in Garrison? We captured a piece of Hudson Valley and put it in the North Garden—every layer from the oaks and hickories to the flowering shrubs below. We're representing the whole balanced ecology, a forest in the heart of the city.

## So the bees and birds are going to be happy?

Butterflies too. The flowering trees in the understory are fantastic

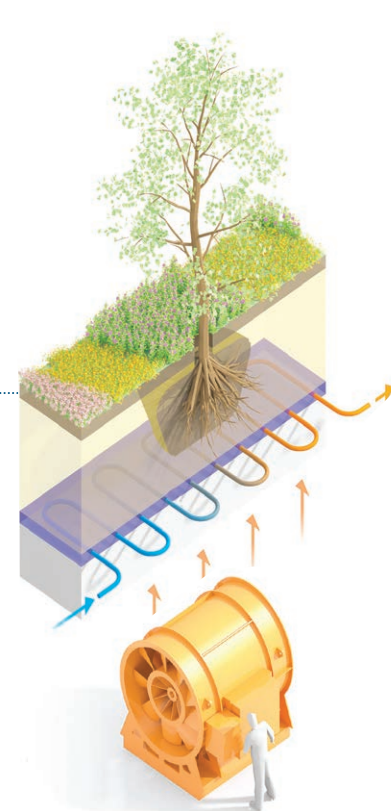
lures for pollinators. Meanwhile, we will get to enjoy a palette of gorgeous colors, from flowers in the summer, leaves in autumn, and colorful plant stems and interesting bark in winter.

## Do you have a special spot?

There's that long bench that is essentially the city's front porch—the ultimate spot for people watching. It sits under a colonnade of black gum trees whose horizontal branches create a ceiling that keeps things on a human scale. The leaves of the black gums turn a beautiful scarlet in the fall.

## Last request. Rock our world.

The island of Manhattan is built atop three types of rock: schist, marble, and granite. And in a nod to the local geological history, it is that last one we used to build the plaza's pavement. This isn't your usual sidewalk. Varying shades of the gray stone create a mesmerizing elliptical pattern that can be discerned from the ground but gets more beautiful the higher you go.



## field note

### The plants and trees have their own climate-control system.

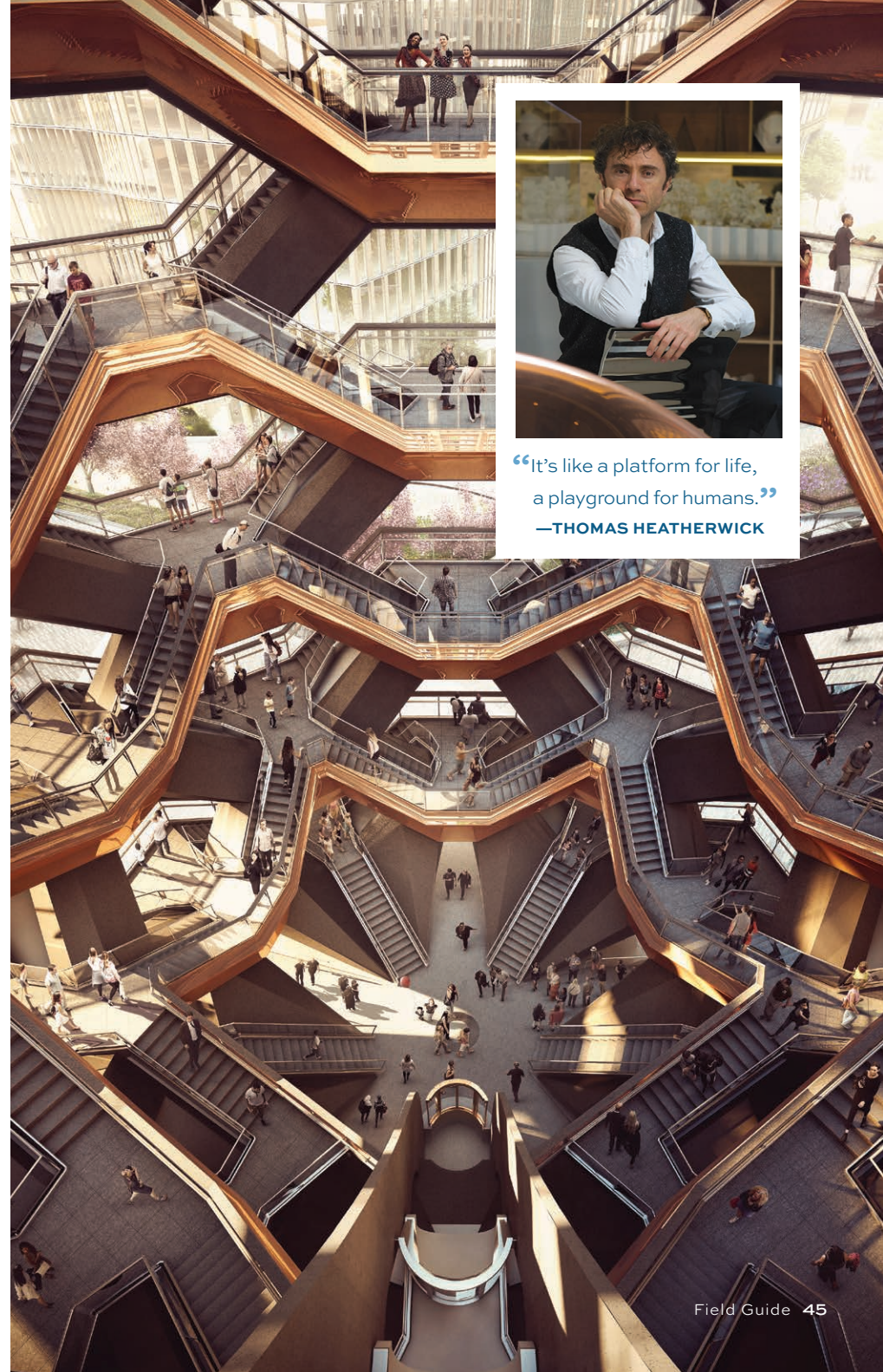
To combat the 150-degree temperatures generated by the rail yards below, cooling water circulates through underground tubes around the root systems of the Hudson Yards' landscaping. A system of 15 large fans—the type usually found in jet engines—also help by blowing 45-mph fresh air breezes toward the tracks.

# The Centerpiece of Hudson Yards

With 154 interconnected flights of stairs—that’s almost 2,500 individual steps!—and 80 landings, this is one monument that lifts the public, literally as well as figuratively. That’s roughly a mile’s worth of pathways in all, or an infinite number of ways to view Hudson Yards, the city and each other. But though the views are priceless, the experience is free. Oh, and don’t worry if you’re not much for climbing: There’s an elevator too.

# Observation Deck

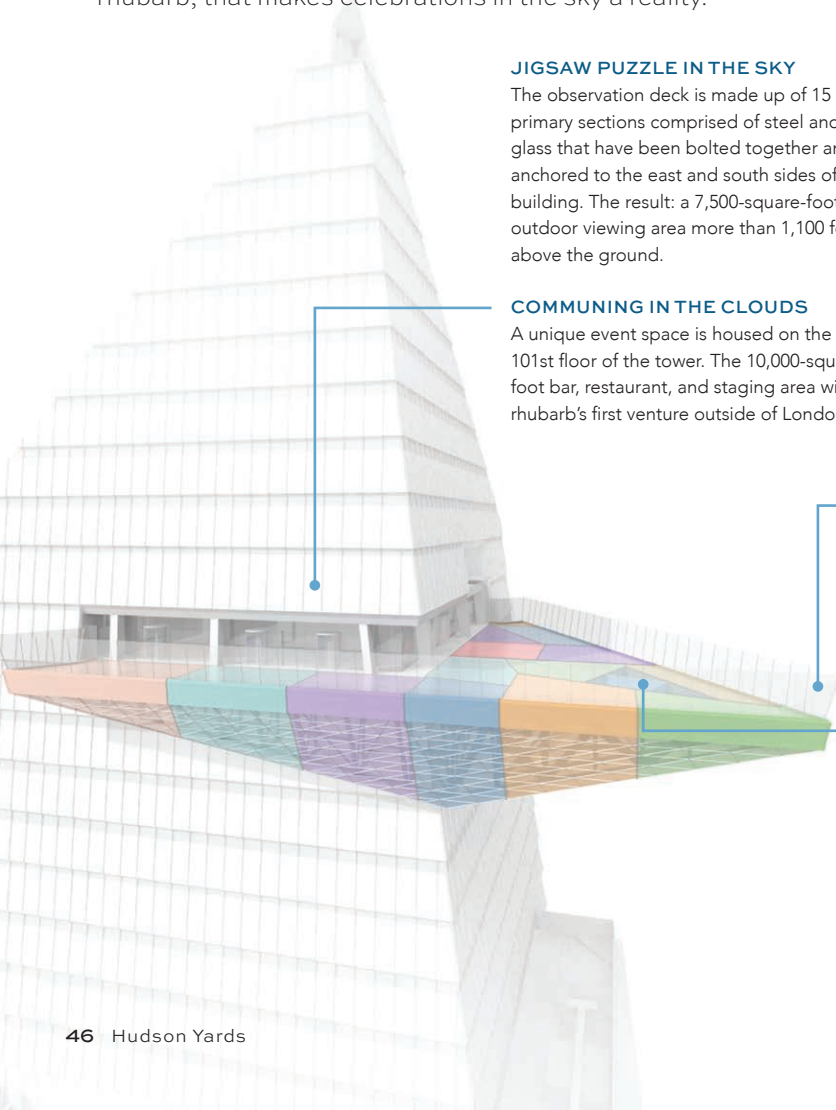
30 Hudson Yards, the neighborhood's tallest tower, is the lofty perch of the highest manmade outdoor viewing area in the western hemisphere (fifth-highest in the world). Accessible from the 100th floor, the platform offers previously unseen city vistas. The view inside, though, is spectacular too: a one-of-a-kind event space, programmed by renowned hospitality group, rhubarb, that makes celebrations in the sky a reality.

### JIGSAW PUZZLE IN THE SKY

The observation deck is made up of 15 primary sections comprised of steel and glass that have been bolted together and anchored to the east and south sides of the building. The result: a 7,500-square-foot outdoor viewing area more than 1,100 feet above the ground.

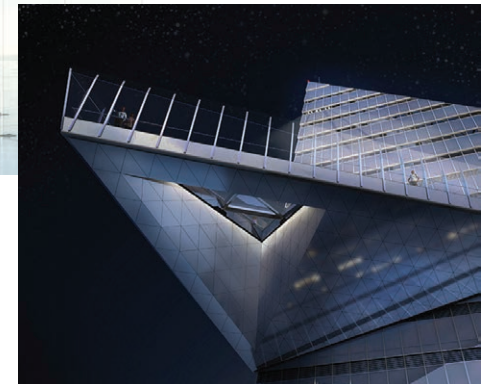
### COMMUNING IN THE CLOUDS

A unique event space is housed on the 101st floor of the tower. The 10,000-square-foot bar, restaurant, and staging area will be rhubarb's first venture outside of London.



### WIDE ANGLE LENS

An angled glass wall, nine feet tall, encircles the deck, providing unparalleled vistas of the New York skyline—and dramatic sunsets to the west.



### BIRD'S-EYE VIEW

A window in the floor offers a breath-taking perspective of the neighborhood below.

*Jaume Plensa's Voices* This site-specific installation includes suspended steel spheres—weighing from 400 pounds to more than 5,000—and mixed elements like stainless steel lettering.



## AT 50 HUDSON YARDS

*Frank Stella's sculptures* Stacked stars of painted steel, aluminum, and fiberglass and a second multicolor, hanging installation will grace the lobby, when the building opens in 2022.

## AT 55 HUDSON YARDS

Financier Steven Cohen's lauded art collection includes works by de Kooning, Warhol, Picasso and Pollock, among others, and some of them will rotate through this lobby. First up, a multimedia piece by Richard Prince.

## THE SHED

### If you're overbooked ...

Busy urban lives make it hard to prioritize charity work. Luckily, plenty of organizations offer flexible volunteer hours. Say you're

a morning person—what better way to start the day than with an early shift at a food pantry? **New York Common Pantry** ([nycommonpantry.org](http://nycommonpantry.org)), which supplies food and support services to nearly 400,000 locals, serves breakfast every day at 7 a.m.

### If you want to get your kids involved ...

Community gardens and art projects or refurbishing neighborhood schools are great entry points for the next generation of philanthropists, and there are opportunities of each kind near Hudson Yards. Not all volunteer opportunities are family-friendly though. So, be sure to vet the experience beforehand.



### If you're flying solo ...

When you're new to an area, volunteering is a great way to build personal relationships with likeminded people.
